SECTION 2 – ACADEMIC DETAILS

Subject Rationale

In this the first of the clinical practicums, students are introduced to Chinese Medicine Board of Australia (CMBA) codes, guidelines and policies in conjunction with clinic procedures and further considerations for registered practice. Students observe the case taking process and implement the interview, palpation and inspection process as their skill in clinical assessment and decision-making develops. Throughout the subject, students observe and participate in clinical case taking through clinical observation and case study analysis.

Learning Outcomes

- Identify and define Chinese Medicine Board of Australia (CMBA) codes, guidelines and policies specifically relating to
 code of conduct, mandatory notifications, infection prevention and control, patient health records, ensuring
 practitioner health, advertising of regulated health services and social media.
- 2. Describe the need and resources for referring clients inclusive of conflicts of interest and practitioners' limitations.
- 3. Participate in a clinical setting showing due respect for privacy, cultural and other differences.
- 4. Identify, discuss and apply the key features of Chinese medicine consultations.
- Continuously display professional and ethical attitudes and the ability to communicate effectively with clients, their carers and families, and work effectively with other health practitioners.



Conduct a clinical interview based on the four (4) examinations in a methodical manner. Collate information necessary to make a diagnosis within the time restraints of a consultation while adhering to CMBA codes and guidelines.
